One-Day Workshop on the Repair and Maintenance of Historic Sash Windows

Date: Tuesday 22 July

This is a one-day onsite course designed to teach participants how they can maintain their own sash windows and see how traditional repairs are done.

The course is open to all levels, beginners, and professionals. Participant numbers are limited to ensure that everyone has the best opportunity to learn

The course will be delivered by Dr. Nessa Roche and joiner John Shorley at Killoran House in Co. Tipperary where work is currently ongoing, giving you a rare opportunity to learn about the theory and practice of window repair, while witnessing the work being carried out in real time by our conservation joiner who will also be on-hand to answer any questions you have.



The day includes;

- Learning how sash windows were made, and how they were designed to work
- The evolution of historic windows and their importance as an architectural element
- How to remove a sash window from its internal frame
- How to remove and replace old glass without damaging the glazing bars and the frame (this and the next point overlap: it could be one point - in practice the demonstration will cover putty, glass and care for the frame)
- How to remove old putty and to reset the glass and apply and finish the new putty correctly
- How to remove and replace rotten damaged or decayed glazing bars and frame parts within the window
- Window weights and pulleys, how they work, and how to get them working correctly
- Catches, what goes wrong with them and how to get them working right
- How to prepare a window for repainting and what paint to use
- Sealing the joints between window frame and masonry

Biographies:

Dr Nessa Roche is a Senior Architectural Advisor with the National Built Heritage Service, Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage. She is the author of the Department's Advice Series: A Guide to the Repair of Historic Windows (2007) and The Legacy of Light: A History of Irish Windows (1999).

John Shorley is a conservation carpenter and joiner with more than 20 years experiece. He has been working on the repair of historic joinery (windows, roofing, shutters etc.) since 2009 and has been working for CALX Restoration since 2020.

One-Day Lime Mortars Workshop for Beginners

Event Information

One-day lime mortar workshop using Natural Hydraulic Limes (NHLs), aimed at beginners who are owners of traditional buildings. Aims to provide knowledge of lime mortar repointing works as part of repairs or more extensive renovation projects to traditional masonry buildings. The course will give an understanding of traditional building technology, repair techniques and the materials to use when carrying out repointing. You will gain an introductory knowledge of lime, and some of the philosophies of its use. The course includes a full safety talk.

Candidates will get the opportunity to prepare the old walls, recognise cement mortars inappropriately applied, before learning about mixing and applying the lime mortar, including how joints and beds should be prepared to receive new lime pointing, use of pinning stones, and understanding about curing conditions for lime mortars to harden.

Course will be led by Dominic Keogh of Memento Mori Stonework <u>https://www.mementomoristone.ie/</u> Dominic is a multidisciplinary stonemason and conservation worker who specialises in traditional stonemasonry, letter cutting, monumental masonry, traditional lime mortars, craft training and the conservation and restoration of vernacular structures. Aine Doyle, Mayo based Conservation Consultant will also be in attendance.
