In recent decades, this traditional method of rope thatching has been replaced by scollop thatching and non-traditional styles.

This two-day introductory workshop is designed with the beginner in mind. The event is aimed at promoting confidence around the use of hot lime and an understanding of how and where it should be used.

Most of our traditional and vernacular buildings were finished in traditional lime mortars externally and then lime-washed to provide important protection which kept walls dry and warm. This course will focus on the preparation of traditional renders using hot lime mortar.

Our course venue is the historic Killoran House near Thurles, Tipperary. The small group numbers will ensure you'll get plenty of attention.

Participants will go away knowing:

- Advantages of using hot lime & appropriate specifications
- The range of aggregates for traditional hot lime mortars
- How to mix lime mortars & their application
- The correct protection & aftercare measures to apply when using hot lime mortars

Course Tutor

The course will be led by Damien Condon, a sixth generation plasterer with decades of experience working with historic structures. He holds a PDD (Professional Development Diploma) in Historic Building Conservation and Repair from West Dean College in England. He also holds a C1 and C2 in Conservation Masonry and SQA, as well as a SCQF in Making Historic Materials from the Scottish Lime Centre. He is the current Vice Chair of Building Limes Forum Ireland.

The course will be delivered at Killoran House, near Thurles, Tipperary, where work is currently ongoing, giving you a rare opportunity to learn about the theory and practice of the repair of historic joinery, with conservation joiners and conservation professionals who will also be on-hand to answer any questions you have.

- Learning how sash windows were made, and how they were designed to work
- The evolution of historic windows and their importance as an architectural element
- Improving the energy efficiency of historic windows, doors and suspended timber floors

Practical sessions will cover

- Workshop setup and what tools to have
- Repairing skirting boards, doors and suspended floors
- How to remove and repair timber sash windows
- Window weights and pulleys, how they work, and how to get them working correctly
- How to prepare historic internal and external joinery for repainting and what paint to use
